Stories from the "Interfaith File"

Every client and volunteer has his or her own story. In this issue, I want to share a few of them with you to help you understand why your help is so badly needed and how your support makes such a difference! Clients' names have been changed, but the stories are real...

Emma has had a rough year. She lost her best friend, and shortly thereafter had a bad fall which resulted in a broken tailbone and chronic pain. She began showing signs of depression. We asked an Interfaith volunteer to call her regularly and develop a relationship. This went on for a few weeks, and then one day Emma stopped answering her phone. The volunteer decided to go over to her apartment to check on her. She found out that Emma had accidentally turned off her phone. But when Emma realized what had happened and that her phone friend had been worried about her, she started to cry - which of course started our volunteer crying too! They've become very close in the months since, visiting each other's homes to compare Christmas decorations and going out to lunch. The volunteer just happened to be in our office the other day when a beautiful floral arrangement came here, addressed to her. It was from Emma, thanking her for being her "sis."

In the same building lives another client whose son in Massachusetts had sent her a 32 inch TV. (cont. on page 2)

"Express" Marks 7 Years!

About seven years ago, the director of C/SF Interfaith gave an appeal for driving volunteers at Sacred Heart Catholic Church in St. Francis. Linda Fono, a married mother of 3 employed by the Medical College of Wisconsin, decided to respond. After going through the volunteer application process, she sat down and talked to then-director Phyllis Dettman about what exactly she would be doing. Phyllis told her that residents at Canticle and Juniper Courts (on the grounds of the old St. Mary's Academy) were asking to go to the nearby Walgreens; since Linda had a large van, would she be willing to start a "taxi service" for these folks?

Well, something like 400-500 round trips later, Linda is still at it. Now a grandmother of 5, but still working full-time, she stops at the Courts every Monday right after work to pick up her "fares." The day I stopped by to take some pictures for this article, she had a very light load – only 3 people. But often she has as many as 8 or 10, and sometimes has to make two or even three trips. She almost never misses a Monday, and if she does, she makes it up on Tuesday.

She asked us if we could find someone to hook it up for her and place it on her entertainment center. We told volunteer John Pradarelli that it was probably just a twenty or thirty minute job. But when he got there, it turned out that the entertainment center was old and rickety and the lady was afraid the TV would fall on her cat. So John found an old TV cart she had which was sturdier and spent an extra hour and a half dismantling the entertainment center and taking it to the dump. The lady and her cat were both very happy!

John is just one example of the kind of wonderful volunteers who "go the extra mile" for our clients. Our driver Jeff Owens, after he's taken them to their scheduled appointment, often asks his clients if there's anyplace else they'd like to go. He knows what a treat it is for these folks to be able to go somewhere that wasn't an absolute necessity. Then there are drivers Larry Kronberg and Neil Arndt, who've many times gone way beyond our boundaries to take people to appointments in Franklin, Shorewood, etc. And Dottie Kukor, a friendly visitor, and Sharan Lunde, Karrie Grady, Patrice Hansen, and Leslie Bendickson, who are helping several frail elders with their housework. All our volunteers are the best!

Virginia is a friendly, talkative 84 year old living in a senior apartment in St. Francis. I asked her if she would try to sell a few tickets to our Prayer Breakfast in her building. At first she didn't have any takers, and she told me later she was "so afraid I'd have to call you and tell you I let you down." But she was persistent, and in the end she sold all five of the tickets we gave her. You should have seen the huge smile on her face when she gave me the money! She was so proud and happy that she could give something back for the help she's gotten from Interfaith. Later, she mentioned to Denise, our Service Coordinator. that she never gets "happy mail," just bills and junk mail. So Denise sent her a greeting card with a funny note. Virginia was so touched she sent us a \$10 donation.

Last week I visited a couple who live in a home on the north side of Cudahy. The husband is in the early stages of dementia. His wife told me that every day, he looks out the window and says "all those cars drive by and nobody ever stops." We've set them up with a Senior Companion trained through the Social Development Commission who will visit once a week. But we're still looking for someone to go over and clean their outside windows...

Save Big \$\$\$ on Your Medicare Premium!

The Qualified Medicare Beneficiary Program (QMB) is a Medicaid benefit which pays your Medicare Part A and Part B premiums, deductibles and co-insurance if you qualify: If your income is below \$902/month or \$10,830 annually for an individual or \$1214.00/month or \$14,750 annually for a couple, you qualify for the QMB program.

If your income is over the limits noted above, you may still be eligible for the Specified Low-Income Medicare Beneficiaries Programs (SLMB or SLMB+) Medicaid can pay for your Medicare Part B premiums up to three months before your application date.

If your individual income is below \$1083/month (\$12,996 annually) for SLMB or between \$1084 and \$1218/month (\$14,620/year) for SLMB+ you qualify for assistance

If your combined couple income is below \$1457/month (\$17,484 annually) for SLMB or between \$1458 and \$1639/month (\$19,670/ year) for SLMB+ you qualify for assistance.

So, if you are 60 years of age or older and reside in Milwaukee County or know someone who is eligible by these standards for this free service, you should call SeniorLAW of Legal Action of Wisconsin at 414-278-1222 during the intake hours listed below.

Bold new program for Alzheimer's family caregivers

Savvy Caregiver Training Program — professional-level training for the non-professional!

Based on research by experts, this new six week course from the Alzheimer's Association will provide clinical-level training for family caregivers. Graduate from this program with improved:

- Knowledge, skills and outlook
- Skills to assess the abilities of your family member with dementia and adjust your approach over time
- Confidence to set and achieve caregiving goals
- Strategies to manage activities of daily living

CALLERS CLAIMING TO WORK FOR THE SOCIAL SECURITY ADMINISTRATION PROMPT WARNING TO KEEP PERSONAL INFO SAFE

MADISON – According to the Social Security Administration (SSA), Wisconsinites have been reporting phone calls from persons claiming to work for the SSA. The caller asks for private information, such as the person's social security number (SSN), in order to "re-issue a Medicare Card" or some other similar excuse.

"The Social Security Administration does not need to ask you for your social security number," says Janet Jenkins, Administrator of the Division of Trade and Consumer Protection's Wisconsin Office of Privacy Protection. "Alarms should go off in your mind anytime someone contacts you out of the blue and asks for personal or financial information. Governmental agencies and legitimate businesses simply don't do that."

Do not trust what your Caller ID says either. It can be made to give whatever name and number the caller wants.

The SSA reminds consumers that except for employers and financial institutions that need your social security number for tax reporting purposes, you are not required to give out your SSN.
