Financial Crunch Continues

Earlier this year, we were hit by government funding cuts. In response to my appeal in spring, several readers responded with generous donations. But overall individual donations actually fell from the last newsletter. And this drop has been going on a long time — *in 2007, private households donated \$16,746; in 2008 that fell to \$8,713, a whopping 48% decrease.*

BBB Alerts Consumers about U.S. Census Workers: Be Cooperative, But Cautious!

For years, Better Business Bureau has educated consumers about not giving out personal information over the telephone or to anyone who shows up at their front door. With the U.S. Census 2010 process beginning, BBB advises people to be cooperative, but cautious, so as not to become a victim of fraud or identity theft.

The first phase of the 2010 U.S. Census is under way as workers have begun verifying the addresses of households across the country. Eventually, more than 140,000 U.S. Census workers will count every person in the United States and will gather information about every person living at each address including name, age, gender, race and other relevant data. The Census 2010 data will be used to allocate more than \$300 billion in federal funds every year, as well as determine a State's number of Congressional representatives. Households are actually required by law to respond to the Census Bureau's request for information.

Most people are rightfully cautious and won't give out personal information to unsolicited phone callers or visitors; however the Census is an exception to the rule. Unfortunately, scammers know that the public is more willing to share personal data when taking part in the Census and have an opportunity to pose as government employees and solicit sensitive financial information.



How do you tell the difference between a U.S. Census worker and a con artist? BBB offers the following advice:



If a U.S. Census 2010 worker knocks on your door, they will have a badge, and generally have a handheld device, a Census Bureau canvas bag and a confidentiality notice. Ask to see their identification and their badge before answering their questions.

Census workers are currently only knocking on doors to verify address information. **Do not give your Social Security number, credit card or banking information to anyone, even if they claim they need it for the U.S. Census.** Census workers will not ask for bank account information nor will they solicit donations.

Eventually, Census workers may contact you by telephone, mail or in person at home. However, they generally will not contact you by e-mail, so be on the look out for e-mail scams impersonating the Census. **Never click on a link or open any attachments in an e-mail that are supposedly from the U.S. Census Bureau.**

Staying Warm This Winter

The Wisconsin Division of Energy Services provides services to Wisconsin qualified residential households with energy assistance and weatherization needs. For info call 1-866-HEATWIS (432-8947). In addition to energy assistance and weatherization, specialized services include:

- Emergency fuel assistance,
- Counseling for energy conservation and energy budgets,
- Pro-active co payment plans,
- Emergency furnace repair and replacement.

If you do not qualify for this low-income program but have a heating emergency, a utility bill you cannot pay, or need to make your home more energy efficient, you can call the Keep Wisconsin Warm Fund through the SDC Southside Center at 643-8444. If you don't qualify for the low-income weatherization program, you can call the Focus on Energy Program at 1-800-762-7077 for help.


